Andover Subdues Troupsburg

Last Tuesday afternoon the Purple Panthers of Andover Central School defeated Troupsburg at the local field by the score of 12 to 0 in touch football.

In the first quarter Andover kicked off with Vic Oakes booting and Bud Dolan holding the ball. On fourth down Troupsburg punted and Dolan, Andover's safety man, returned the kick 60 yards for a touchdown. The point after touchdown failed. Troupsburg received the kickoff and Vic Oakes booted one over the goal line and Troupsburg returned it to their own 20-yard line. Andover's only goal line stand came in the first quarter but was stopped when Dolan intercepted the ball on his own goal line. The first quarter ended 6 to 0.

In the beginning of the second quarter the Panthers first team came into the game and remained in until a few minutes before the game ended. Throughout the second and third quarter, the ball was in Troupsburg's half of the field with Andover having position most of the time.

In the fourth quarter, Andover scored on an intercepted pass. Bill Dugan intercepted a pass on the 50-yard line and raced across for the second touchdown of the game. Louis Fulkerson and Dick McAndrew made the touchdown possible with very good blocking. The point after touchdown failed. In the closing minutes of the game the second team came back into the game. The score at the end of the game was 12-0.

Andover's line played a good game when they kept rushing Troupsburg's backfield so they could not pass or run. The backfield played its best defensive game of the year, with Bill Dugan intercepting most of Troupsburg's passes.

The backfield also showed good offensive drive, but lacked scoring punch. All of the Andover players played good ball. Nettles was the Troupsburg outstanding player.

Ex-Senior Vividly Describes College Life at Cornell

The following letter, written by Charlotte Coryell, was recently received by Miss Barrett:

9 South Avenue,
Ithaca, N. Y.
October 11, 1939

Dear Miss Barrett:

We've all been here three weeks on Thursday but it seems as if we have been here a long time. It took us a good week to get acquainted with the buildings and some people. The first day of classes, two weeks ago, was very interesting because there were so many of us who didn't know exactly where to go. Since then, classes have run smoothly.

Everyone hears so much about registration. For us home economic students it was very easy. A tentative schedule was made out for us. If we liked it, we kept that or we made whatever changes that were possible. Mine was all right. I am taking 17 credit hours: Journalism 3, family life, 2; foods and nutrition 5; hygiene, 1; Orientation, 3; and English 3; Hygiene, Orientation and English are required subjects for all home economic freshmen. Hygiene is taught by a M.D. She teaches us about health and the usual health facts. My two family life classes are my only 8 o'clock classes. One hour a week is spent in observation booth where we watch the two, three and four year old children in the nursery school. We have sheets of questions to answer from what we observe.

Our three classes in foods and nutrition are lectures. In these, we take up the hows and whys of cooking.

As the word suggests, orientation is to help us get acquainted with the university and home ec. college and to make ourselves a part of it.

You can imagine what English is about. Our text book is named "Intelligent Reading." The object of the course is to be able to read intelligently.

I've left the journalism course until the last. One thing that keeps me worried in this is that I have to have all my work typed. I can't type so I have to have it written long enough ahead of time to have someone type it for me. I am certainly learning a lot in this course. I've learned that there should be just four w's in the first sentence in a news article. When, why and how are added, it almost puts in the personal angle which editorializes it. I get the Hi Herald each week and I like the initialed articles. I have to guess who wrote them. Here's hoping the paper continues as well or better than it is.

Every Saturday night there is a roller skating party. The straight, Willard Straight, is open to everyone at all times. There is a browsing library, music room, game room, cafeteria, soda bar, theatre, restaurant, barber shop, dance hall, rooms for visiting teams, alumnus, etc., and about everything anyone could want.

We had to buy freshmen buttons. They were white with a green "C" on them with a green "43" inside the "C."

Please have the kids write to me often.

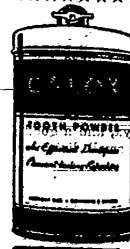
