Milk Agreement Misleading Says Holton V. Noyes

State Ag. Commission Declares Responsibility Failure of Sept. Price Mayor LaGuardia's.

Albany, Oct. 24.—Failure September milk price to reach \$2.15 per hundred pounds dairymen had been led to believe they would receive, is the fault of Mayor LaGuardia, New York City, Commissioner H. Noyes of the State Department of Agriculture and Markets told state milk producers.

Commissioner Noyes said: "It is not surprising that men are disappointed because will not receive the \$2.15 per hundred weight price which they led to believe they would get from the publicity attending LaGuardia's settlement of the milk controversy."

"Only a casual reading of the agreement would lead one to believe that it contains nothing to the effect that New York milk would be paid \$2.15. Unfortunately, few dairymen trouble to read the agreement. Little effort was made by the state to explain its provisions."

"All that was agreed to was that the price for milk used in the city would be increased to \$2.15 per hundred weight. If the price was used in these four counties, it was expected, but guarantee of the parties signed agreement, that the final price to be paid would amount to \$2.15."

"At the time of the settlement, particularly emphasized, was the plan guaranteeing a price return. I was sure an ultimate price possible only if sufficient milk was used in the classifications. The prices had been increased to \$2.15 per hundred weight. This warning because I did not want to be a party to a contract which, I was not sure, could be met."

"Any statements, therefore, attempting to place responsibility on this Department for the misunderstanding and disappointment to so many dairymen, wholly unjustified. The self, who received credit agreement, must now, it seems, take the responsibility for the failure and the resultant result."
