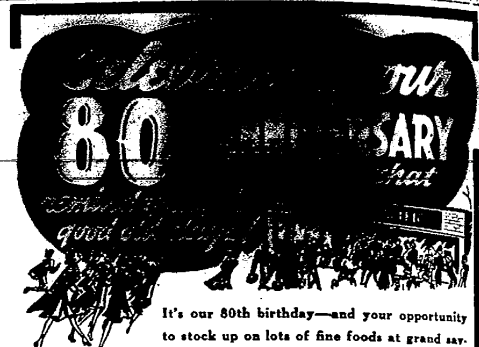

Overdue Payments Would Raise Milk Price Says Noyes

Dealers in Arrears to Hold Answer to Sept. Price Falling Under Says Ag. Commissioner

Albany, Nov. 1.—Commissioner Noyes of the Department of Agriculture and Forestry declared that "if back pay due to the (New York) market under the marketing orders has not been paid up in September, the price would have exceeded \$2.00."

Commissioner Noyes said leaders who advocate with milk from the market "cost their followers and the dairy industry generally by insisting that to whom they deliver milk with existing orders." The commissioner continued:

"According to Administration, there is \$366,000 of monies owed by non-complying producers to the Producer Settlement for the period September 1, January 31, 1939. If this had been paid up in September, it would have increased the price for September by 11 hundred pounds which, plus additional monies paid as a LaGuardia agreement, have brought the total price for that month \$2.19 per hundred pounds, cents more than dairymen have been led to believe they receive under the mayor's plan."

"This indebtedness is just under the United States Supreme Court decision upon marketing agreement and must be paid. If these dealers would promptly pay their debt without compelling resort to slow and costly litigation, I think the result would be more satisfactory and better for the whole industry. Instead of a new withholding of milk from the dealers who counsel course should direct their to persuading these dealers a course is more advantageous to their own interests as well as the industry's."
