Students Inquire About Student Council

What is the purpose of Student Council?

How many will be on the council?

Will it organize any new clubs?

These are a few of the many questions asked by various students since the offer of a Student Council was made, and which is the highlight of A. C. S. at the present. These questions are answered now so that all may have a better understanding of this organization.

First, the purpose of a Student Council is mainly to help the student body and faculty to co-operate better with each other in the student activities of the school.

Secondly, like all organizations, there has to be a head body of representatives from different parties. The two parties are namely the Co-operatives and Progressives, and from a choice of six candidates, which have been chosen, three will be elected for the council at a later date one person from each class will be elected, making a total of seven council members. There are no set qualifications as yet for these members, but in another year the council will probably make out definite ones for the new members. Their term will be for one year.

In answer to the "any new clubs" question, it is hoped that the clubs the school already has will be better organized and that new clubs will be organized when the students show a definite interest in them.

"Will it promote a ruling by students?" it is asked. This may be answered both yes and no. As far as extra-curricular activities and class parties and the like goes, the students will be privileged to suggest how and what they do, subject to faculty approval.

But in regard to the administrative part of school, the faculty will have their regular authority.

The procedure in setting up these parties was partially done by the faculty of necessity this time, but in the future the council will assist in the organizing.

This council will try to provide a most interesting program for this year. More and better assemblies will be held of different types. The continuation of Social Hour will be made and it is hoped that a great deal more will turn out in the future than the number who appear at the present time.

In general, we all hope that thru this Student Council we students will be able to do the things we have wanted to do before but for some reason couldn't, and that thru better co-operation on both sides, Andover Central will become the outstanding school with a more democratic system of, by and for the students. —A.L.H. —ACS

Prof. Armstrong Speaks at A. C. S. P. A.

Professor Armstrong, at the first meeting of the Allegany County Scholastic Association meeting held in Cuba Central School October 31, told reporters of mistakes in their papers and how to correct them. He spoke somewhat as a professional because he was once editor of the Montreal paper.

He said the first thing taught a cub was the five w's. Next in importance was the keeping of reports strictly accurate. Make it interesting if possible, but certainly accurate. Errors in English were the greatest trouble in school papers. They were too general and abstract. The setting and keeping of a deadline for copy should be made in every school. Once a reporter passes his deadline, he should be fired. A paper cannot be run slipshod and still progress. Every assignment should be given and acknowledged personally. Then it's up to the reporter to get his news in on time.

Professor Armstrong told listeners there should be more human interest stories. Stories that appeal to all because of their peculiarity or humor. More names were needed in the papers too. (Incidentally he added, they should be spelled correctly above all else names make news. A balance was lacking in all papers.) Write the articles on the topics the most people are interested in and you'll have a paper you will be proud to send anywhere. He closed his speech with a bid for questions. Several were asked of him and he answered by using illustrations received as a cub. Professor Armstrong was wholly in favor of the A. C. S. P. A. and wished it a "bon voyage." —B.J.L. —ACS
