E. A. Mullen Is Re-elected Supervisor

With the Exception Dr. S. B. Scott, the E. Republican Ticket Wins in Andover.

E. A. Mullen was re-elected supervisor of the town of Andover Clifford Howland, the Democratic candidate in Tuesday's election by a plurality of 181 votes, the exception of Dr. S. B. Scott, the Republican candidate for who ran ahead of his opponent, the entire Republican ticket was elected by substantial margins. The "horses" lost in 33 to 187.
