Biology Explorers Find Fossils

Many fine specimens of oddly-shaped fossils were found by a group of 12 biology students, accompanied by Mr. Maloy and Mr. Holmes, on their second field trip held last Friday afternoon. The party explored a creek bed northeast of Andover in search of fossils which they have recently studied about, and found several very good pieces of rock with imprints of once-living animals. The age of rock around Andover was found to be that of the ironian age or the Paleozoic era dating back nearly 350,000,000 years. Most of the rocks were that of limestone, sandstone and shale. The fossils of this Devonian rock, which were found, were invertebrate animals with shells.

Having noted the effect of the water on rocks and fossils, a collection of some of the best specimens was made, the cold "explorers" assembled about a fire where they eagerly roasted marshmallows. After an hour or so of fossil-hunting the students hiked back to their respective cars and started homeward having enjoyed another interesting biology field trip.
