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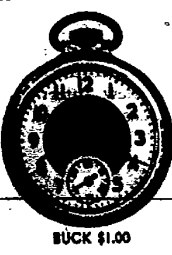
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## Driving Licenses Show Increase

Albany, Dec. 7. Business is on the upgrade at the state Motor Vehicle Bureau, Commissioner Carroll E. Mealey said today in announcing that it had taken just ten months for the number of driver licenses, registered vehicles and receipts to exceed 1938 totals.

In approaching the four million mark, the number of licensed drivers in the state has reached an all time high. Compilation of license statistics show that 3,933,244 persons are now licensed by the state to drive. This is an increase of 187,230 over the 1938 total.

A breakdown of the license figures revealed that of the total number of licenses in force at the present time, there were 3,046,188 operator licenses, 827,460 chauffeur licenses and 59,596 junior operator licenses. Of this number, 3,677,196 are three-year licenses and 256,048, one year licenses.

Registered vehicles for the ten month period numbers 2,712,514, a gain of 43,715 over those registered last year.

Gross motor vehicle receipts reached a total of \$47,503,122.64, an increase of \$883,979.37 over the 1938 total of \$46,619,143.27.
