Last week I promised 'Hunt About' this \$4.25 trapping license. One reason for the delay was that the last issue of the New York State Sportsman gave in its summary of things to come up before the meeting of Conservation councils that took place in Troy, N. Y., Dec. 7-9 was the new trapping law.

In a report just received, there was no mention of this. Now about the why of the law: From hearing this discussed by various parties it seems that the ones to profit most by this act is the commercial trapper and the New York State Conservation fund, and the ones holding the bag are the little fellow or the one that only catches a few furs. Pardon my saying this. I hope it will be a lesson to the small line trapper and especially the farm lad who has a few dollars and some sport trying to catch furs. The Conservation Department does not stock skunk, mink or weasel to my knowledge, as they are considered predators, and to be kept under control. I think if this group of sportsman, mainly the farm lads and town lads joined their local club and helped them up a big howl that this law might be changed to a fair one. Not just a law to protect a few commercial trappers who must have combined to get the present law thru.

January 1st the Andover Club starts issuing new membership cards good for 14 months or until one year from March for \$1.00 and it is

the desire of this club to bring the farmer who harbors the game and fur closer to a mutual understanding of each other and to work more closely and harmoniously together.

The club members, thru their affiliation with the State, to secure more fish and game to stock the woods, fields and streams and also our fine ponds. Now membership counts in more ways than one, first in getting legislation to govern the set-up, to carry on various activities connected with the better caring for the fish and game we now have and to get a larger allotment for our area. I think most everyone who happened in or near the fields and woods this season are well satisfied that there are a lot of hunters. Now we are informed that Allegany county produced the most buck deer killed in the Southern Tier counties by several hundred and the best part of it was no one was killed by being mistaken for a deer. In Pennsylvania several were shot the first day.

Well here is to another deer season another year and I hope you hunters all come and join your local Rod and Gun Club.

Harmon Announces

November Milk Price

A uniform producers' price of \$2.28 per hundredweight for 8.5 per cent milk received from farms during the month of November at handlers plants was announced last Thursday by E. M. Harmon, administrator of the Federal-State milk marketing pact.

The November price is an increase of one cent per hundred over the October price and a gain of 18 cents over the November 1938 price.
