### Cazenovia Youth Winner In Grange Safety Contest

Washington, D. C., Dec. 18.—John R. Hurlbut, Cazenovia, N. Y., is the winner of \$10 and a silver medal which will be awarded to him by State Grange Master Raymond Cooper of Oswego, as first prize in the New York Grange safety essay contest. The awards have been sent to State Master Cooper by the Highway Education Board, which assisted in conducting the contest.

Hurlbut's paper is titled "Making Rural Communities Safe Through Grange Activities." The contest is a part of a nation-wide Grange program thru which the farm organization has stated it is attempting to lower the toll of rural highway accidents.

## Over \$2,700 in Cash Paid to 500 Careful Drivers to Date

During the last four months the Keystone Safety Council, operating thru Keystone gasoline stations in Northwestern Pennsylvania and Southwestern New York, has awarded and paid out \$2,745.00 to careful and courteous motorists observed and reported performing acts of safe driving along the highways and in the towns and villages in this area. Awards have ranged from \$5 to \$25 each and have been spread among some 500 car owners.

Andover, Almond and other neighboring towns in Allegany and Steuben counties have accounted for over 25 careful drivers selected for these awards who have received nearly \$250.00 since the Safety Legion campaign opened August 16.

Observers reporting to the Keystone Safety Council do not look for spectacular or heroic deeds, but have been instructed to concentrate on acts of common courtesy which tend to make the use of the highways safe and pleasurable. One objective of the Keystone Safety Legion campaign and weekly cash awards which accompany it, is to provide an incentive for motorists to abide by the sentiments expressed in the following paragraph which appears as a preface to the hand book of the Automobile Association of Great Britain and which was recently broadcast to over half a million of its members: "With good manners, particularly as with life itself, it's the little things that count. Every unimportant moment we concede to fellow travelers is an investment in the Bank of Good Nature, returning interest a hundredfold. We must school ourselves readily to concede that unimportant moment—to allow to others their right and proper share of the road. Courtesy begets Courtesy."

The Keystone Safety Council is now supplying license tag emblems indicating membership in the Keystone Safety Legion and over 3,000 of these tags have been distributed since Dec. 1, 1939. Anyone owning or operating a motor vehicle may join the Keystone Safety Legion and become eligible for the weekly cash awards by visiting a Keystone gasoline station and signing a membership roll. No purchase is required and no obligation is incurred by the member.

The Keystone Safety Council is posting \$300.00 for the week ending December 20 to be divided into three \$25.00 and forty-five \$5.00 awards.

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## No License Required on Farm Tractors

Albany, Dec. 19.—Attention, New York State farmers! You don't need a license for that tractor used exclusively for agricultural purposes.

This was made clear today by Commissioner Carroll E. Mealey of the Bureau of Motor Vehicles, in response to a flood of inquiries from all parts of the state.

Misunderstanding in this connection has grown out of the new law which permits the licensing of farm vehicles at the low rate of one dollar.

This law, which is effective January 1st, makes it possible for farmers to obtain a special "farm" registration for "motor vehicles, trailers and semi-trailers operated upon public highways connecting farms or portions of a farm."

Commissioner Mealey explains, however, that under the Vehicle and Traffic Law, tractors "used exclusively for agricultural purposes" are not classified as motor vehicles and therefore no registration is required.

The Commissioner also called attention to the fact that a vehicle which is "designed and primarily used for other purposes and only occasionally drawn by a motor vehicle" such as a hay-rake or wagon, requires no registration.

Other vehicles, such as trucks and passenger cars, registered for one dollar and bearing the "farm" plates may only traverse such highways routes as connect farms or portions of farms under single or common ownership or operation. The route, to which a vehicle so registered is restricted, is described in the certificate of registration.
