## Certificate of Condition Must Accompany Used Cars

The State Motor Bureau wishes to call attention of buyers of used cars of the following requirements of the Vehicle and Traffic Law:

An amendment to the Vehicle and Traffic Law, effective last September, requires auto dealers to certify in writing to the purchaser of a second-hand vehicle that "brakes, lights and signalling device are in condition and repair to render, under normal use, satisfactory and adequate service upon the public highway at the time of delivery."

Failure to deliver this certificate or the delivery of one that is false or misleading, is not only punishable by revocation or suspension of certificates of registration and license plates, but upon conviction by a series of graduated fines not exceeding \$100.
