**Southern Freeze Causes Rise in Produce Prices**  
Department of Agriculture Report Shows Some of the Highlights of Damage to Southern Crops.

Albany, Feb. 5.—Special received by the New York Department of Agriculture news, augmented by reports from the United States Department of Agriculture show some of the damage to Southern crops by cold weather in that resulting changes in Northern produce prices.

Practically all Florida show severe damage. Dependable estimate is year as to percentage decrease of the crop. In Texas, cabbage shows splitting of heads following loss of a 25 per cent loss in the month. February shipment of Texas will be reduced accordingly to assure considerable gain for shipment in March. In Alabama the cabbage in the district was largely destroyed by 14 degree temperature on 27th, but a considerable quantity is expected to be replanted.

There is still uncertainty as to the damage to the Texas orange crop. Heavy losses are expected in the Bend and Wilson areas. But some reports that the damage to Bermuda, the Laredo and Winter sections is not as serious as temperatures might indicate.

In the Hasting Florida potatoes were growing above the ground, and some have escaped damage in Dade county (in which about 60 per cent of the crop has been ready for harvest in the middle of February, has been entirely ruined. Current shipments of potatoes are now coming from the Everglades section, but less than half of this crop has been marketed. So, with current now out of the picture will be a decided gap in the size of Florida potatoes.

Citrus Fruit: In both and Texas suffered very serious, but the full extent of damage cannot yet be estimated. The Florida citrus commission declared a temporary embargo on shipments of oranges, tangerines and grapefruit to prevent the price of frozen fruit on the market to show the full extent of the loss, with the certainty that heavy. This of course applies to Florida and Texas and California, which escaped the low temperatures which occurred elsewhere.

Tender vegetables, flowers such as peas, snap beans, plant, and tomatoes—also flowers—are about a total loss. The Southern producing areas have immediately this week sharp price increases for many of these products now practically no fresh available.
