Prattsburg continued to lead one division of the Steuben county C league by defeating Savona by one point while Jasper, Troupsburg and Arkport are tied for the leadership in the western half of the county.

The first team certainly was off in its game at Almond, Thursday, missing many baskets, also making bad passes and fumbles. However, Nobles, Perry and Gath all turned in good games.
