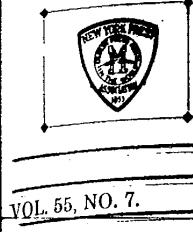

## Steps to Lower Farm Risks Are Urged By Noyes

Tells Farm-Home W Audience Sound Business Principles Will Make Farming Secure Industry

Ithaca, Feb. 14.—The wise permitting milk to monopolize production in New York is "tioned seriously" by Commissioner Noyes, head of the Department of Agriculture and Forestry.

Speaking before a Farm and Home Week audience at Ithaca on Feb. 14, Commissioner Noyes said these fears and doubts were voiced today because I want to preserve the undoubted benefits of dairying. But, more important, that we want to place our agriculture upon a more stable and consequently more profitable basis. I do not want to see our emphasis so heavily on dairying. If we were following sound business practices in our agriculture, I do not think we would for a moment be neglecting the development of supplemental crops to diversify our income and distribute our risk. I do not want to see our production of crops on land which we have already taken off and done nothing to re-forest or fertilize or crop rotate. I do not think we would attempt to make a crop from farms which long ago have been converted to reform or recreation, because a soil would show them to be adapted to these purposes. I do not want to see our cities, but trusting, citizenizing the cities to risk their small farms which scientific would reveal as incapable of producing much less producing than their purchasers.

"There are agencies to change our course. Let us instead of riches one by one and more dependable income our farms with the risk of loss widely distributed and less dangerous."

Talking later in the day at the WESC microphone at the Commissioner Noyes commended intelligent discussion of farm problems, the purpose of Farm and Home Week. He made a new plea for cooperative action to bring about better and happier days for the industry.
