## Route Schedule of Andover School Busses

### Six Busses Bring a Total of 204 Children to Andover Central School. Bad Shorten Routes.

To settle a number of questions regarding the various school routes, and for the information of many who have not argued the question, we have procured copies of the various school routes operated by the Andover School and are herewith publishing them.

These schedules have been modified for the past year and are gradually enlarging as the weather permits, it is expected they will be back in complete form soon. The route schedules are as follows:

Bus No. 1, David MacKay, driver. Goes from Andover Valley corners, up Elm Valley to L. E. Fairbanks, where it proceeds down state road to Hollow road; goes up Duffy to first fork; turns around state road to Jay Burdick where it turns around and back to Andover Central making 95 stops and picking up children.

Bus No. 2, Edward Kilbane, driver. Goes up Independence road to Crandall street, out call street to Quigg Hollow; turns right to Frank Nye's around at Nye's and proceeds down Hill road to state road; goes up Shovel Hollow to house; turns around and proceeds to Andover Central making 14 stops and picking up 36 children.

Bus No. 3, Robert Shirey, driver. Goes up Independence road to John Lewis corner; turns right to Kenyon corner; turns to Lewis corner; turns to Wilson farm; returns back to Independence and down hill to making 12 stops and picking up children.

Bus No. 4, Edwin Alderson, driver. Goes up East Valley to top and back to school. Then proceeds to Ed. Green's and back to school; 14 stops, 14 children.

Bus No. 5, Rollin Scott, driver. Goes up Slocum Hill to Lynch farm; turns around; turns to foot of hill and goes to Baker's and back to state road; turns right up Indian Creek; Dean's corner and back to school. Seven stops, 25 children.

Bus No. 6, Vivian Sweet, Jr., driver. Goes up state road to Ed. Green's; proceeds up hill to Elm Valley county highway; turns left again at Pingrey corner; proceeds over Pingrey road to Pingrey corner; turns down Pingrey Hill to school; 9 children.

The busses bring a total of 204 children to Andover Central School.
