

Allegany County In PWA

Capt. T. W. Poindexter Makes Interesting Announcement Relating PWA Projects in County

Allegany county has more public works than any county per capita in the whole state, according to figures submitted by Capt. T. W. Poindexter, PWA engineer, stationer, Wellsville.

This county also led the in applications for PWA (per capita) for the 1939 year which is quite a contrast with tarragus county, our neighbor west, which was one of two in the whole U. S. A. having projects at all.

This really means in round that Cattaraugus county, Federal system of taxation, had pay for our new sewers and waterworks with many improvements for the county. It also means that all school and village officials in getting more than share of Federal funds that are around.

Twelve new and beautiful have been built in Allegany since the start of the PWA in 1933, all in the last few months and mostly for Centralized five three village water systems sewage disposal plant and station.

The year 1939 brought to heavy public construction decade to the State of New York due to Public Works Administration recovery program, started by completed during the PWA director Colonel Gilmore announced today.
