Block Move to Reduce Oleo Rates; Lower Maple Rates Continued

Albany, Feb. 27.—Efforts of the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets to prevent lowering the freight classification rating on oleomargarine below the rate allowed for butter, have been successful, according to word reaching the Department's Traffic Bureau from the carriers' consolidated classification committee.

Other dairy interests joined the Department in protest against oleomargarine rates under the butter rates, contending such a move would constitute unfair competition for New York State milk producers. The case inaugurated by the margarine manufacturers has been pending since last April.

The department at the same time announced that lowered express rates on maple products have been extended for another year by the Railway Express Agency. Maple cream is included, along with maple syrup and maple sugar, if the product is to be shipped outside of New York State to another state when does not restrict the use of that trade term.

Lowered express rates represent a reduction of 20 per cent in the 100-pound rate, with even greater reductions on smaller shipments. The charge on a shipment weighing 14 pounds or less cannot exceed \$1, regardless of the distance shipped in the United States, the Traffic Bureau said.
