### Charles S. Lusk Dies Suddenly Tuesday Night

Tip Top Man Passes Heart Attack at Home Tuesday Evening Funeral Friday.

Charles S. Lusk, well known Erie track foreman and one of the famous "Octopus" men, died suddenly Tuesday night at his home at 9:40 o'clock after a heart ailment which had been suffering from a heart ailment for some months, but was seen worse and his passing came as a surprise to the community.

Charles Sumner Lusk was born July 24, 1866 on Niles Hill, John C. and Eliza Burdick

moved to the home at Tip Top where he has since resided. He was twice married, August 1901 and in marriage with M. O'Meara whose death occurred in 1895. Sept. 27, 1901 he married Miss Grace A. Wiles, a son, Lowell Lusk of Andover.

Mr. Lusk had been a player of the Erie railroad retiring on a pension several years ago. Since his retirement he has turned his attention to collecting of freaks of Nature which he had enjoyed for many years which resulted in the establishment of a museum of stone fossils collection, to which many cement reproductions of his own modeling. The museum "Octopus tree" which Mr. Lusk covered near his home highly entertaining and to hundreds of people from all over the country who have visited the museum.

Services will be held home Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock by the Rev. Edgar D. VanEenwyk officiating and interment will be in Maplewood cemetery at Alfred Station.
