Andover people were shocked Monday morning when it became known that Hayden Rogers had passed from life from a heart attack occurring at 4:20. Mr. Rogers suffered a heart attack nearly a year previous from which he apparently had recovered, and although not been feeling well for a number of days, his condition was not too alarming. November 29, 1906 he was married in marriage with Miss S. Ina Rogers, who survives with a daughter, Mrs. Denzel Baker, a son, A. Rogers and four grandchildren, Fred and Francis Baker, Gay and Jerry Rogers all of Andover; one brother, Ray D. Rogers, Wellsville survives. Mr. Rogers was affiliated for years with the Andover Lodge and the Wellsville Elks and was a member of the Andover Presbyterian church. Funeral services were held Monday morning at 2 o'clock, the Rev. Kenneth officiating and interment at Whitesville. Compulsory Insurance Bill Introduced A compulsory automobile insurance bill, prepared and sponsored by the State Departments of Insurance and Taxation and Finance was introduced in the Legislature last week. The main substance of the bill is that no registration for an automobile will be issued unless the owner first filed a certificate of insurance as evidence of liability for up to \$5,000 for each bodily injury or death and at least \$10,000 for all bodily injuries or deaths from a single accident. Although the bill has strong support it is not expected to urge its passage at this session, but it is expected that the bill will be enacted after the next session of the Legislature after it has had a year's thought and study, so as to overcome the objectionable features that have arisen from similar bills in other states.
