Motor Vehicle Commissioner Mealey Issues Warnings

Albany, May 1.—Motor vehicle license issuing offices thruout New York State have begun the renewal of chauffeur licenses which expire May 31, 1940.

Commissioner Carroll E. Mealey of the Bureau of Motor Vehicles last week advised district and county clerks' issuing offices to prepare for the May renewal period and additional supplies of application forms have been forwarded.

Chauffeurs who are uncertain about the expiration date on their licenses are advised to examine them.

With "moving day" here again, the commissioner also reminds motorists about changes of address. The Vehicle and Traffic Law requires all car owners and operators to notify the commissioner in writing of any change of residence within ten days.

Hundreds of licenses are suspended every moving season because motorists overlook this provision of the law.

Details for the proposed parkway along the east bank of the Genesee river just off Main street were announced last Thursday evening by David A. Young, president of the Wellsville Chamber of Commerce at the annual banquet.

The proposed plan provides for a parkway along the Genesee river from Fassett street to West Pearl street with an extension of Madison street to the parkway. Tentative plans also call for the setting aside of a plot of land on the river bank for the construction of a fire station, village lockup and police justice offices, as well as considerable parking space.

This project has been under construction for some time and if carried out will be a big help in solving Wellsville's parking problem.
