A new system of apple storage has been announced whereby apples can be marketed as fresh in May or June as in the fall. The plan calls for an air-tight storage room in which the percentages of oxygen and carbon dioxide can be regulated. Experiments have shown that in such a room with temperatures maintained at 40 degrees, oxygen at 2 per cent and carbon dioxide at five per cent, apples will keep fresh and juicy.

Developed in Waukesha, Wis., about a year ago, the product is shipped by truck direct from Waukesha to Miami. The product now retails about 3 to 5 cents cheaper than fresh bottled cream.
