**American Legion**  
**To Combat Fifth Column**  
**Deputy Sheriff Milliman of Belmont Placed in Charge of This Work in Allegany County.**

The Allegany County American Legion took steps at their last meeting to assist in combating any Fifth Column activity in Allegany county.

The following letter submitted by A. E. McGuire of Alfred University, who is also American Legion member of the Alfred American Legion, was presented at the meeting and received the unanimous approval of that organization:

The American Legion:  
 This is the time for us to think by both thought and action to meet the loyalty and devotion of our country. Our greatest danger at this time and in the next few years to come is not from within, in the form of disintegration and disloyalty due to fifth column persons now living in our country enjoying its blessings.

I am amazed at the lack of education, understanding, and loyalty among so many persons to the government. We need to engage in the greatest house cleaning in the history of the nation. It is too late. We need to realize this fact. I wish, therefore, to submit for your earnest consideration the following:

- 1—Yesterday, the House of Representatives passed quickly and to the Senate a bill which prohibits the Bureau of Immigration from taking out of the Department and placed under the Federal Bureau of Investigation. This should certainly commend the State should act quickly.
- 2—There has been a proposal some that the F. B. I. be given the right to do wire tapping. F. B. I. needs this privilege in order to deal with fifth column organizations, then we should support this in Congress.
- 3—There is a proposal that aliens be fingerprinted. This should be heartily supported. We should see to it that our citizens are withdrawn from all danger zones of war. We should immediately prove, if need be, our devotion to the United States, unless they can show a good cause why they should be here.
- 4—We should withdraw from the United States all disloyalty to this country and a loyalty to other government. This will be a new law. Some of these citizens become citizens and not by heart in order to more effectively for other nations than our own. They should be denaturalized immediately. There can be no without responsibility. If of speech and action is used to stay this government and of life, then we must take from destructive forces.
- 5—We need to prevent the United States all with foreign "ism" to spread the nation. We should of the care of our share of the American Legion has the greatest opportunity in its history to serve this nation at and during the next few years. You support the ideals and fundamental notions stated above six principles?

The American Legion, state and nationally is interested about the Fifth Column steps thru all its channels to authorities in every state to combat this invisible danger to the safety of our country. In Allegany county Deputy Sheriff Lloyd Milliman of Belmont has been placed in charge of this work. I request that anyone who has any knowledge or suspicion of American activities in the
