Noyes Salutes June as National "Dairy Month"

Commissioner Points to Unsurpassed Quality of Milk and Other State Products.

Albany, June 3.—Commissioner Holton V. Noyes of the State Department of Agriculture and Markets today saluted June—the National Dairy Month—with a statement directing attention to "the unsurpassed quality of our dairy products, especially milk."

"New York's milk supply has been called the purest in the world," Commissioner Noyes said. "Whoever called it that, probably meant that nowhere is any purer milk sold for public consumption and no more safeguards taken to maintain that purity up to the moment it is delivered to the consumer. I imagine

there are other states and possibly other parts of this globe where the supply is just as pure as it is in New York State but I am quite sure that none of those sections can surpass New York State in the purity of its milk.

"Look at a glass of good, rich milk. Seems to be a rather simple fluid altho tempting, doesn't it? But that's where looks are deceiving for milk is a very complex substance. It contains a mixture of all the important things that comprise a mixed diet. You can get the same nourishment from milk as from a meal made up of meat and eggs, sugar and cereals, oils and fats, with salt and water added for good measure.

"Milk is good fuel, but it goes farther than that. It repairs waste, helps growth, builds flesh and bone and does a great many other things for us. Besides, its daily delivery is even more certain than the United States mail, despite that the problems of distribution are a highly

complicated mechanism. "Without qualification, I heartily commend the dairy products of New York for their unsurpassed quality, not only during this month, which is being observed as National Dairy Month, but thruout the year."

The Department of Agriculture and Markets, thru its Consumers' Information Service, is distributing a free information and recipe book entitled "Call the Milkman." This new publication will be sent upon request to the Department at Albany.
