Alfred Man Suffocated At Sand Plant

Archie G. Norton, 26, of Alfred Station, employee of the Alfred Atlas Gravel & Sand Company was suffocated to death shortly before noon Monday when he was buried under tons of sand while working in a loading bin.

Dr. George W. Batt of Angelica, Allegany County coroner, said Mr. Norton was working alone at the time and it is not definitely known how he happened to fall into the bin. He had a bump on the side of his head but was otherwise uninjured physically, Dr. Batt said.

Fellow workman rushed to the rescue but he died before the material could be removed and his body taken from the deep storage bin.

Mr. Norton is survived by his wife, Mrs. Reva Perry Norton, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Norton and five brothers all of Alfred Station.

Services were held Thursday afternoon at Alfred Station church.

Belmont Man Commits Suicide
