tural shop unit is located in the east wing and consists of a classroom in which the agricultural classwork will be given and a large shop room, which is equipped with work benches They will tool cabinets and tools, wood lathe grinder, drill press, circular saw forge and anvil, together with num erous small tools for all types of shop work. Milk testing equipment also will be installed for instructfor all types of ional purposes. At one end of the shop the floor is of concrete, and a large lifting door has been provided to permit the bringing in of large machinery for use in the shop work

The Administrative Offices consis of a reception room and genera office, handling office calls and rou tine, and the principal's office, which also serves as the Board of Educa rion's meeting room. From the Principal's office is controlled the combined radio receiving and public address system, which permits the reception of educational programs from broadcasting stations outside the school and for announcements by

the principal through the building.

The first four elementary grade will occupy rooms on the first floor The Cafeteria is located in the

center wing, directly across the conridor from the auditorium. Th place will seat about 100 persons The cafeteria was designed primarily for use by the pupils who come on busses or who live too far away to go home to their lunches. Pupils may bring their lunches, and supplement them with hot dishes from the cafeteria or a full lunch may be pur-chased. It may be necessary to divide the lunch periods into shifts, with the younger pupils eating dur-ing the first shift and the older ones during the later shifts.

In addition to its use as a dining hall, the cafetera will also be used hall, the cafeters will also be used as a music practice room at other time than the noon lunch period. Adjacent to the room is the music teacher's office and storage room for instruments. A small stage is at one end, where small groups present programs or be seated for banquet occasions.

The dominating feature of the second floor is the School Library. The seating capacity is about 60 pupils, and the school routine will provide for its definite use as a study room at stipulated periods by the high school students. Adjoining the library is a Library conference and work room. The library is finished in white mahogany and the furni-ture matches the woodwork. Equipture matches the woodwork. Equipment includes a librarian's desk, teacher's desk, card catalogue file, dictionary stand, a book truck and book shelving of harmonizing finish, besides the usual tables and chairs. The Home-Making Suite has a south exposure, and consists of a Living Room and Kitchen unit. The Living Room is equipped with the furniture ordinarily found in a mod-

furniture ordinarily found in a modern home, and also several work tables and sewing machines for the classwork in sewing. At one side of the room, there are built-in storage compartments and wardrobe spaces.

The Kitchen furniture c two cabinet sinks, four portable cabinets and a built-in section of cab-inets along one wall. Along this same wall are installed two kitchen ranges and a refrigerator. A dining room table and chairs, with service for eight persons, are also included in the kitchen facilities. The wood-work and cabinets are finished in

A Corrective Exercise Room and Typing Room also are features of the second floor. The former room is used for individual corrective exercises, under the direction of the physical education teacher, and is equipped with stall bars, horizontal posture mirror and mate The Typing Room will be equipped with drop-head typewriter desks with standard makes of supplied

typewriters. This room will be used for bookkeeping and other com-mercial subjects as well.

The Science Laboratory contains

four six-student laboratory desks, at which individual experiments in Physics, Chemistry and Biology can be curried on. There are also 24 tablet arm chairs and a teacher's demonstration desk in the front of the room which will be used for plants and perennials.—Thorne's Heclass recitations. Two Faculty Rooms, one for me and the other for women teachers,

are also on the second floor.

The west wing on the second floor will have the fifth and sixth grades, while the east wing and front of the building house the Junior and Sen-ior High School groups.

Through the building are general architectural features, with varying points for special needs of some particular room. The floors in the classsrooms are oak block. In the classrooms are oak block. In the hallways and cafeteria, the floors are terazzo, while in the library they are cork, to deaden sound. In the auditorium and gymnasium, the floor is narrow strip maple. The library and health room have rubber tile and the kindergarten and home-making has lineoleum.

Indirect lighting has been installed throughout, except in the auditor-ium, shop, laboratory and cafeteria, where it is from recessed lights.

A telephone system operates from the General Office to all rooms and basement, so that the principal can be in communication with any part

of the building promptly.

All grade rooms have built-in wardrobes. Corridor lockers are provided on the second floor for high chool students.

The heating system for the school will be with natural gas, and consists of boilers with which either coal or gas can be used in the basement and heat control equipment through the buildings.
