DISH FOR THIS WEEK

Either freshly mashed or leftover potatoes combined with milk, eggs and butter are delicious for any meal, whether it is simple or elaborate. The following recipe, suggested by the New York State College of Home Economics, is easily prepared.

Potato Puff
2 cups of hot mashed potatoes (about 6 medium potatoes)
2 eggs
1 cup of milk
2 tablespoons of butter or other fat.
Add to the mashed potatoes the fat, the egg yolks (beaten until very light) and the milk. (One-fourth cup of grated cheese may be added if desired.)
Stir this mixture until it is well blended, then fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites, mix lightly, and pile the mass in a well-greased baking dish, set it in a pan containing hot water, and bake it in a moderate oven (about 375 degrees Fahrenheit) for 20 to 30 minutes. Serve at once.

A dinner menu might include: potato puff, meat patties, chopped fresh greens salad, carrot strips, whole wheat bread and butter, fruit, milk at least for the children, and coffee, tea, or milk for the adults.

Seven states in this country define fresh eggs as merely "eggs laid within the state."

The United States' milk supply totals 51 billion quarts annually; as a river it would be three thousand miles long, 40 feet wide, and more than two and one-half feet deep.

Canned food that spoils should be buried with one tablespoon of lye to each quart, because spoiled food, if eaten, may cause animals to become ill.
