In this publication appears an article by C. G. MacNay of the Division of Entomology, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, Canada.

### "Hoss Swappers" In Educational Role

The 1940 Horse Trader's Convention at Almond, beginning the 12th of August, will inaugurate a new and interesting feature as a part of the parade that is to be given on Wednesday, Aug. 14.

It has developed that a greater portion of the young people graduated from our city schools (as well as many students of rural schools) have never had first hand knowledge of the types and varieties of horse drawn vehicles that were so com mon only a scroe or so of years ago.
The parade committee with Ralph Whiting in charge, is sending out a call to rural communities to resur-rect from their ancient storage as many specimens of such vehicle many specimens of such venters are possible, each rig entered to be plain-ly labeled with a placard giving the type of vehicle and the owner's name.

The list desired includes a hor drawn surrey, a horse drawn phae-ton, a buck-board; Canopy-top bug-gy; Victoria; two wheel sulky; dog-cart; chaise; hack; hurdick; dray; hearse; express wagon; band wagon; democrat wagon; stage coach; Tally-ho; and any other of the standard varieties of horse drawn vehicle, reminiscent of the days when a "spanking" team of "high-steppers" was a popular indication of a man's rating in his local community.

In addition to the vehicles men tioned the committee also is request-ing entries of a horse with side saddle ridden by a lady dressed in riding habit that conforms to the side saddle era.

A tandem outfit, a four horse team, a team of mules, also a team of oxen, as well as a prospector's harro, with camp kit and pack.

In a tent on the convention ground will be exhibited for the benefit of the younger generation, draft and driving harness complete from crouper to blinders with each strap or part marked with its proper name.
