 Blinding Headlights Blamed for Accident. Car Jumps Ditch and Badly Damaged.  
 Four Andover young people seriously injured when the car in which they were riding left the road and turned over on the Alfred-Almond road Sunday morning.  
 The occupants of the car, Virgilie Nobles, Miss Jean DuDonald Joyce and Edward Joyce were taken to St. James Mercy Hospital, Hornell. Miss Nobles sustained fractures of one leg and a bruise; Miss Dunham bruises, Joyce a shoulder injury and Dean escaped with minor bruises. According to reports filed by Dean, driver of the car, he was ed off the road when blinded by lights of an approaching car, did not stop.
