Rochester Area Dairymen Obtain Increased Prices

Following a public hearing, the amendments ordering an increase in the minimum price for fluid milk to \$2.90 per hundred in the Rochester Marketing Area were effective November 1st.

Commissioner Noyes, in reporting his findings from the hearing, stated that the poor quality of hay and corn silage this year caused by adverse weather conditions, the increased cost of dairy rations and the increased cost of farm labor in the Rochester area all add to the cost of production of milk in that area.

The amended order also eliminated the town of Mendon from the marketing area.
