License Places to Close at 10 P. M. Christmas Eve

The Allegany County Alcoholic Beverage Control Board has voted to make permanent a regulation to close all licensed establishments for the sale of alcoholic beverages at 10 p. m., Christmas Eve, Dec. 24th. The regulation has been enacted each year for the past several years and ABC board members decided this year to make the ruling in force each year.

To compensate for any loss of business as a result of the Christmas Eve rule, members of the board also voted to make permanent a lengthening of the hours on Jan. 1 from 1 a. m. to 3 a. m. The 1 a. m. closing hour has been in force here for several years.

The Christmas Eve ruling applies to all licensed places while the Jan. 1 extension applies only to licenses for on-premise consumption.
