Onions, at 1940 levels of price, will have added about \$4,724,000 to cash sales from farms in New York by the time the storages are cleared out. This item was \$4,297,000 a year carlier and \$2,915,000 10-year average. The 4,108,000 sacks of 100 pounds each grown on 15,500 acres, compare with 4,092,000 sacks a year ago and 2,327,000 sacks the 16-year average. These were produced on the extensive muck areas, of which the largest are Orange county. New York, in 1940 produced about a third of all the late-crop onions in the 17 late crop states, extending from Massachu-setts to California. In late winter and early spring, Texas and other states usually have abundant supplies of onions for market.

Among other commercial veget ables of substantial importance in New York are snap beans, beets sweet corn, cucumbers, green peas and tomatoes, all of which are grown both for market and for canning In addition and grown mainly for market in fresh form, are carrots, cauliflower, celery, lettuce, green eas, strawberries, and a number of ther vegetables.
In 1940, commercial vegetables in other

Potatoes are grown on a large proportion of the farms in New York State. In 1940 Long Island's production was more than a half greater than in 1939; in contrast, upstate 1940 production was more than a fourth less than in 1939 because of serious losses from blight and freezing.
