## Selectees Must Keep In Contact With Local Board

### Changes of Address or Changes in Conditions on Which Deferment Was Based Must Be Reported.

Selective Service registrants of New York State are warned by Brigadier General Ames T. Brown, State Director of the Service, that the law requires each one to keep his local board informed of any change in his address and any change in conditions affecting any deferment he may have applied for.

"Failure to receive a questionnaire, order or other notice from a local board does not excuse a registrant from complying with the notice," said General Brown. "The Selective Training and Service Act expressly stipulates that 'it shall be the duty of each registrant to keep his local board advised at all times of the address where mail will reach him. The mailing of any order, notice, or blank form by the local board to a registrant at the address last reported by him . . . shall constitute notice to him of the contents of the communication, whether he actually receives it or not.' Section II of the act provides that a registrant failing to comply with any duty prescribed by the law within the required time shall be liable to fine and imprisonment."

"National headquarters of Selective Service has been informed by the Department of Justice that many of the reported delinquencies of registrants have resulted from carelessness in failing to inform the boards of changes of address.

"We who are concerned with the administration of Selective Service want to help registrants to avoid any such liability to punishment. Attention by all to the need for keeping addresses up to date on local board files will help us to avoid having men needlessly labeled as delinquents.

"Another obligation imposed upon

registrants by the act is that of notification of local boards, within five days, regarding any change in circumstances affecting a deferment, granted or applied for.

"For instance, if poor health was the basis of deferment, improvement in that condition must be reported at once. If a dependency deferment was asked, any change such as a dependent's death, obtaining or employment, an inheritance or separation of a dependent from the registrant's support, must be reported. A deferred student must report if he leaves college before the expiration of his deferment.

"It is because of the occurrence of such changes in the status of registrants that all deferments were limited to a maximum of six months."

Increased opportunity for students interested in business education will be available in the College of Liberal Arts at Alfred University with the opening of school in the fall of 1941, according to President J. Nelson Norwood.

The increase will give a total of six special fields allied with business. Those now offered are economics, commercial teacher training, and general and specialized secretarial training; accounting, banking and finance, and business management will be added. For the school year 1941-42 the present personnel will have charge of the courses: Prof. C. E. Galbreath in economics, and Prof. J. E. Whitecraft and Miss Agnes Pearson of the business and secretarial studies.

"The demand for courses in the field of business at Alfred has been growing for several years. It was to meet this demand that the department of business and secretarial studies was organized in the College of Liberal Arts in 1939. The immediate success of this department, together with the student desire for other courses in business, warrants the venture now being undertaken," said President Norwood.
