County Jail Now Rates

As Federal Prison The Allegany County been included by the U.S. Bureau

been included by the U. S. Bureau of Prisons as fit for the emergency housing of Federal prisoners.

As of January 1, the Allegany county jail was one of 335 jails thruout the country, out of 3,117 inspected by prison bureau officials, which were authorized for emer-

which were authorized for emer-gency use by United States mar-shals. As an emergency fail, it was said

at the prison bureau, the Allegany at the prison bureau, the Artegany county institution will get prisoners awaiting Federal court action for short detention periods, but will not get those serving even short Federal Court and the country and the court and the al sentences. The government pays a flat per diem rate as "board" for each such prisoner assigned to the local jail.

Eleven factors are used by the prison bureau as a hasia for rating jails as to suitability for incarceration of Federal prisoners. These factors are (1) administration, (2) buildings and equipment, (3) cleaniness, (4) conditions of employment and industry, (5) discipline, (6) ed-ucation and recreation afforded prisoners, (7) food, (8) medical service, (9) personal hygiene practices, (10) personnel and (11) religious nstruction provided.
