County Jail Now Rates As Federal Prison

The Allegany County Jail has been included by the U. S. Bureau of Prisons as fit for the emergency housing of Federal prisoners.

As of January 1, the Allegany county jail was one of 335 jails throughout the country, out of 3,117 inspected by prison bureau officials, which were authorized for emergency use by United States marshals. As an emergency jail, it was said

at the prison bureau, the Allegany county institution will get prisoners awaiting Federal court action for short detention periods, but will not get those serving even short Federal sentences. The government pays a flat per diem rate as "board" for each such prisoner assigned to the local jail.

Eleven factors are used by the prison bureau as a basis for rating jails as to suitability for incarceration of Federal prisoners. These factors are (1) administration, (2) buildings and equipment, (3) cleanliness, (4) conditions of employment and industry, (5) discipline, (6) education and recreation afforded prisoners, (7) food, (8) medical service, (9) personal hygiene practices, (10) personnel and (11) religious instruction provided.
