County Welfare Employment Service

Can the average citizen be of assistance in relieving the problems of public welfare in the county? Can the rehabilitation of dependent families be aided by the general public?

To these questions the Allegany County Public Welfare Committee answers: "Yes, the average citizen not only can, but should make efforts to lessen the Public Welfare problem."

The committee also states that its studies have shown that there are people receiving public assistance who are employable and who are willing and ready to work. The past work experience of these people covers many types of employment, including casual labor, part time domestics, farm workers, oil workers, industrial workers, etc.

The studies of the committee also indicated that the average cost of maintaining a family on home relief in this county approximates \$25 per month. They also indicate that there are unemployed persons in need of jobs during every month of the year. For example, during the past summer there was a very small number of employables receiving assistance.

The majority of these found jobs and became self-maintaining, others, however, lost their employment and at this time there are approximately one hundred employables who can be placed if suitable employment is available. On the basis of past records, many of these will find jobs in the near future. A real saving can be effected, however, if the duration of their period of dependency can be reduced.

It is of significant importance to all taxpayers if jobs can be secured the need for public assistance may be curtailed, or eliminated. The average saving possible is, of course \$25 per month. By multiplying the monthly saving per case with the number of employables who may receive assistance during the course of a year, the possible savings in home relief expenditures reaches substantial figures.

Such savings would, of course, be reflected in local tax reductions.

These savings, however, are not possible without complete public interest and co-operation in finding employment for the person who needs a job and who, without such a job, becomes dependent on public funds. In order to co-ordinate public co-operation in this rehabilitation program the Public Welfare Committee has placed in your town a list showing the work experience of employables in need of work from your town as well as from all other towns in the county.

All citizens are urged to use these lists and to notify the Public Welfare Department in Belmont if they are interested in hiring anyone appearing on the list.

The committee having the county employment lists in Andover is Fay E. Boyd, Mrs. C. C. Backus and A. D. Fuller.
