Industrial shop courses given at the Cuba Central School as a part of the National Defense training program are open to young men in Andover and vicinity, according to

Andover and vicinity, according to a letter received by Principal G. E. Bretsch from Mr. Ralph H. Fyyrett who is in charge of the courses.

The program is given afternoons, Monday thru Friday, from 3 to 6. There is no charge for the courses and it is expected that the boys will take advantage of any employment opportunities even tho they have not finished their training.

The only requirement is that the young men be between the ages of 17 and 24. Entry into the course may be made at any time.

Three afternoons are devoted to shop work which includes sheet metall foundry, force machine lather.
