Crop and Loan Applications Received at Belmont April 15th

C. G. Graybeal, field supervisor for the Emergency Crop and Food Loan office advises that farmers who desire to apply for crop and feed loans for this season should arrange to file their applications with him at the Farm Bureau office, Belmont for Allegany county, Tuesday, April 15th, between the hours of 10:30 a. m. and 2 p. m.

Where loans are made to tenants, the landlords or others having an interest in the crops financed or the

livestock to be fed, are required to waive their claims in favor of a lien to the Governor of the Farm Credit Administration until the loan is repaid.

Since checks for approved applications are issued by the Regional Office at Springfield, Mass., those who desire loans from this source should make application now. At the request of the borrower, issuance of the check may be deferred until desired. Interest runs from date of check and not from date of application. All applicants are urged to see Mr. Graybeal at the time and place stated.
