

last month reached a high of 700,-078,105 pounds as compared with 647,176,075 pounds in May a year ago. The seasonal increase from April of this year was 17.4 per cent with daily deliveries going up from 19,232,006 pounds to 22,583,165 in

"The advance in production apparently was the result of two causes -namely, this spring dairy farmers had a price incentive to step up the quantity of milk their herds proauced and weather conditions were favorable to such an increase. The prices dairy farmers paid for feed in each month so far in 1941 have the same or less than the cost of feed in 1940. Because of this favorable ratio, the daily grain ration reached seven pounds a cow on May 1, the highest since 1931. Pasture conditions on the same day were 84

"Milk used for fluid cream (Class II-A) was worth \$2.12½ this May as compared with \$1.65 a hundredweight last year. The surplus classes which accounted for nearly 53 per cent of the milk in the pool, were similarly worth about 50 cents a hundredweight more this month.
