Allegany County Fair Officials Name Judges

Dr. K. I. Turk, director of the Animal Husbandry Department of the University of Maryland, will judge the dairy exhibits at the Allegany county fair this year. Dr. Turk was formerly a member of the Cornell University Dairy Husbandry staff and has a wide reputation as a judge of dairy cattle. In all classes three divisions of animals will be made notably excellent, meritable, and honorable mention. A total of \$1,600 in premiums will be awarded in the dairy cattle division.
Dr. Arthur J. Pratt of Cornell University, well known judge of vegetables and garden produce, will return to the Allegany county fair after an absence of three years to judge the new combined show in this department.
Morton Adams, president of the New York State Draft Horse Society will return to the county fair this year to judge the draft horse exhibits. It is anticipated that there will be a much larger show of draft horses due to the changes made by Mr. Adams in the premium list. Several additional classes for draft horses have been included.
