Children's Health Camp at Cuba Lake Opens

Will Open For First Period July 6th With 90 Children Enrolled. Second Group Enrolls July 27.

The Children's Health Camp at Cuba Lake, conducted annually for 21 years by the Allegany Health and Tuberculosis Association, is to open July 6 for a three week period with 90 children enrolled. On July 27 this group will be replaced by 90 more children who will remain for three weeks and on August 17 the third group of the same number of children will enter for a two week period.

These children will be given a good time of organized play, craft work, careful medical attention, building healthful diet, etc. The first group of children come from 12 communities of the county: Alma, Andover, Belmont, Bolivar, Cananda, Canaseraga, Cuba, Little Genesee, New Hudson, Kushford, Scio and Wellsville. This group was selected from a list of 600 names as the most likely to be benefited by a stay under the expert guidance in the healthful location of the camp following physical examinations and a careful personal check up. Children from other places will be taken care of in later camps.

The personnel of the 1941 camp is: Camp director, Miss Catherine M. Codispoli, Belmont, executive secretary of the association; play directors, Harry Blakeslee, Ithaca College graduate, the past year physical director of Belfast Central School; Helen Jammer, Wellsville, Junior at Cornell University; counselors are Elaine Barth, Rochester, junior at University of Michigan, Jean Rogers, Belmont, Sophomore at Fredonia Normal School, Andrew Coccarri, Belfast and Thomas Tucker of Wellsville; nurse, Doris Blakeslee, R.N., Cortland Hospital graduate who will next year be school nurse in Belfast Central School; cook, Miss Mary Childs, Cuba, graduate of

Rochester Mechanics Institute and for the past two years manager of the cafeteria in the Cuba Central School; and Dr. Loren P. Bly, Cuba who examines all children on entering camp and is always subject to call.
