CARE OF SLIP COVERS

A slip cover can be protected from wear and tear, and the laund-ering or cleaning reduced if the arms and back of a slip-covered chair are covered with removable pieces of the same material, cut so that the designs match. Such pro tectors can be made large enough to lie flat if the edges are finished with cotton tape and pressed.
