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County Officers Elected at Fillmore Convention

The Andover Fire Department, Firemen's Auxiliary and the Andover American Legion Band journeyed to Fillmore last Thursday afternoon where the annual Volunteer Firemen's Convention took place. The Andover department was awarded second place as the best appearing company.

At the annual business meeting held Wednesday the following county officers were elected:

Arthur J. Gormley, Belfast, president; Walter Hand, Belmont, first vice president; Frank Royce, Cuba, second vice president; Karl H. Buehring, Wellsville, secretary since 1930 was re-elected; J. F. Dunning, Bolivar, treasurer, re-elected.

Fritz Graves, chief of the Wellsville fire department, was chosen as delegate to the state convention and Roy H. Colburn, Fillmore, retiring president, delegate to the Southwestern New York Association Convention.

A resolution was passed endorsing the Emergency Defense Program of President Roosevelt. It was reported that 512 county firemen have been blood typed and are ready to help in case of emergency. The effort to type all volunteers will continue, and a booklet listing their names, addresses and types, with "blood brothers" in the American Legion of the county will be furnished physicians and hospitals.

Summer Reading Club

For the fifth year the librarian of the Andover Free Library, assisted by Mrs. Glenn E. Bretsch and the library staff, is conducting a Summer Reading Club during the vacation months of July and August including the school children from the first thru the fifth grades.

This year the theme is "The Pilot's Flight Club" (P.F.C.) When each borrower has read his or her first book, a pilot license is issued to each reader and the reading of this book symbolizes a flight of one hundred miles. In order to complete their flight, ten books must be read or a flight of 1,000 miles. At the completion of the 1,000 mile flight a gold star is placed on the reader's airplane. This program is creating a great deal of interest among our juvenile borrowers as several gold stars have been issued and the readers are making another flight.

Retired Supreme Court Justice Bernard B.
