Washington, July 23.—Sweeping high above all former records, the 1941 Celebration of the President's Birthday to raise funds for the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, produced a net total of \$2,104,460.53, President Roosevelt was told today. This was \$697,214.79 more than the previous high mark set in 1940.

3:30 p. m.—Presentation of judging contest awards.

Other events, planned by a committee from 13 Western New York counties, include exhibits on calfhood vaccination, artificial breeding, control of mastitis, and the feeding of dairy cows.

## Potato Acreage Reduced

A reduction of five per cent in New York State potato acreage is reported by the State Department. The reduction in potato acreage is reported general in the 30 potato states, where the acreage reduction is eight per cent below last season and 17 per cent below the ten-year average. Indications at present point to a reduction of 7 per cent over last year's potato crop.
