Mrs. Jenny C. L. Hardy, 68, died at 3:30 p. m. Monday in the Sixth Street hospital, the result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident in Onsted, T. C. she was riding with Mrs. L. J. Britton also was injured and the Tecumseh hospital.

Mrs. Hardy was 1869, in Melbourne daughter of the late Eliza Hauck Law. Education in private schools, Germany, Italy and at the Art School in Naples.

An accomplished Mrs. Hardy was the Michigan Equine and a special equal suffrage active in state Red Cross work. Mrs. Hardy was Bishop Law of Warren Hastings, England. Edna vated to the peer of India. Her father founded the old business in Australia first to export to California. Her mother from Andros, C. C. became a Protestant. She was married in London, England. She had made her for many years, hand she leaves to Clarence W. Hardy, medical corps at Harold D. Hardy.
