## HOW, WHAT AND WHY?

Do not ask more than one question in one letter or on one postcard. Ask as many questions as you like, but make each one a separate communication.

**Farm Management**  
C. M. writes: "I would greatly appreciate your recommendations on a farm management textbook."

Prof. S. W. Warren of the agricultural economics department suggests the following: "Farm Management," by R. R. Hudson; "Farm Management," by G. F. Warren; "Farm Economics," by App and Waller; and "Profitable Farm Management and Marketing for the Corn Growing States," by Overton and Robertson.

"The first two are published by Macmillan; the last two by Lippincott. In our farm management course at Cornell, we do not use a text but the organization of the course follows Warren's book closer than any other."

**Paint Peels From House**  
B. C. wants to know what to do with the outside of a house where the paint is peeling. The house is not to be repainted this fall.

Prof. R. J. Robb of the agricultural engineering department answers: "Scrape the paint with a putty knife or a wire brush in the spots where peeling occurs. Paint these spots with a varnish primer, made by cutting the paint with linseed oil and turpentine with varnish added. This is in preparation for painting the entire house next summer."

"If the paint is peeling only in small patches, inspect the house first to see if poor carpenter work has allowed water to get thru small openings to the wood. If so, scrape or wire-brush off all the loose paint, fill the openings with calking compound and then patch the paint as suggested."

**Cat and Dog Fleas**  
Mrs. A. S. writes: "Our cellar has become infested with fleas. How can we get rid of these awful things?"

Prof. R. W. Leiby, extension entomologist, answers: "The pest is the cat and dog flea, known to many as the sand flea. Infestations usually become known when folks return home from a vacation and when the house pet has been absent from the premises a week or so. The fleas are then starved and bite humans."

"This is also true when house pets are suddenly removed, as the fleas concentrate on humans instead of the cat or dog."

"To kill the fleas, use a rotenone powder or spray. Apply it to an infested dog or to basements or places where house pets commonly sleep. Treatments must be repeated at five-day intervals for three weeks."

"Dogs can be bathed with a creolin or lysol soap solution, and a strong flea soap lather will kill the fleas. Infested rooms can be 'defleaed' by rubbing a clothes-cleaning solution into rugs and upholstery and on floors, with special attention to floor cracks that contain lint. A vacuum sweeper will also gather many fleas and their tiny worm-like stages."

For each dozen eggs produced, a hen will consume about seven pounds of feed.

To cut down on weeds in the garden next year, keep the weeds from going to seed this time of year.
