Room Assignments Bus Schedules For School Opening

Some Routes Are Changed Slightly—Schedule Same As Spring.

The following room assignments and instructions are given for the opening of school next morning. Some changes in assignments are also given.

Kindergarten children brought by their parents to the kindergarten room in the front of the east building. The minimum age for kindergarten children is by February 1, and an afternoon section established, but for the first children should come in the morning. Parents may express to which session they prefer.

Grade 1 pupils will room 123 which is also wing, first floor. Pupils 1 should be at least five years old at the opening. All pupils younger than kindergarten. All of the work will be under the direction of Miss Lillian Butler teacher, Miss Dawn Seg in the work.
