registrants who have been deferred for occupational reasons. "Local boards should bear in mind that when classifications of registrants who were deferred because they were contributing in their civilian occupations to the national health, safety and interest—in industrial, agricultural, or profession-'al activities-are reconsidered they must again be given notice of clas-'sification and accorded the same

> when they were classified original-While any registrant who is reclassified may appeal within ten days after mailing of his notice of classification, General Brown said, he lurged that these who have occupational deferments, or their employers, anticipate such action if they desire extension of deferment. "Any registrant whose period of deferment for an occupational reason is expiring, or his employer, should formally request his local | board for an extension well in advance of its expiration" he said.
