**Waftings From WANDERING WILLIE**

IT HAS always been and we hope it always will be the privilege of the men in the service of any country to have a uniform that is distinctly different than those of the civilian. There is always something about a uniform that seems to set men in the army, navy, air force or marines apart—and we think that is the way it should be.

But not long ago, one of the "boys" who served "over there" in '18 brought it to our attention that every Army and Navy store and many of the ordinary stores were selling shirts and pants almost identical worn by our soldier boys of '41. And after keeping an eye out for these shirt-and-pants outfits we got the surprise of our life in finding out that the older soldier was right.

Perhaps you have seen a fellow going down the street with one of these same khaki outfits on and you were all set to greet one of "the boys" who was home on furlough—only to find that it was one of the local fellows going to work.

We don't know whether to place the blame on the stores selling these outfits or on the fellows not in the service who wear them, but we do think that our U. S. uniform should not be duplicated for \$1.85 per suit—with no military service!

AND while we are talking about soldiers' such, we would like to remind the folks who are hollering about rising prices and taxes just how well off we are. The war in

Europe is on its third year and we are still not in it, but keeping out of it simply because we are spending the dough and no bleed.

Why we happen to stress this point is that we were looking at a copy of a paper from a village about the size of Wellsville, located in our neighboring Dominion of Canada, and which contained a list of fellows killed in the R.C.A.F. (Royal Canadian Air Force). This list, the paper stated was the 69th official casualty list published since the beginning of the war and it contained 81 names, with a curt note at the bottom that the lists would probably increase in the future.

So let's just pat ourselves on the back that all the bleeding we are doing is from the pocketbook and not from the heart. When it makes you mad to think of the sacrifices you have to undergo—think of what it would mean if those lists were published in this paper.

SOMEHOW, perhaps we're a trifle thick-headed, but we just can't figure this one out. Perhaps you folks can. Anyhow it goes like this:

The horse and mule live 30 years  
And nothing know of wines and beers;  
The goat and sheep at 20 die  
And never taste of Scotch and Rye  
The cow drinks water by the ton;  
And at 18 is mostly done;  
The dog at 15 cashes in  
Without the aid of rum and gin;
