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Increased Taylor Memorial Scholarship Awarded Wellsville Girl

The O. P. Taylor Memorial free scholarship fund at Alfred University, founded by the oil producers of New York State has recently been increased by special gifts of \$600 and \$1,000, from the original amount raised of \$8,400, to an even \$10,000. It was Orville P. Taylor, a gallant Confederate soldier educated in New York state who came north at the close of the Civil War and on June 12, 1879 completed the first commercial oil well in Allegany county, at Petrolia, after repeated failures that resulted in near bankruptcy. Mr. Taylor was a resident of Wellsville where he died in 1883.

The first Taylor student, Miss Jean Millspaugh, a graduate of the Andover High School, was graduated with honor from Alfred University in June and is now teaching French and Latin in Avoca High School. The Taylor scholarship for the next four years has been awarded to Miss Jean M. Gardner of Wellsville, a brilliant student, highly recommended by the faculty of the Wellsville high school from which she was graduated in June. The free scholarship is open to graduates of the high schools in the oil producing townships of Allegany county. The Taylor memorial free scholarship is perpetual. The principal of the fund is invested and the income provides a free scholarship for four years. Students to whom the Taylor scholarship is awarded must have high scholastic standing, be ambitious, and in need of friendly financial assistance in order to secure a university education.

"Sergeant York" To Be Featured at Babcock

One of the most eagerly awaited screen events of this or any other year begins Saturday as "Sergeant York" starts its engagement at Warner's New Babcock theatre in Wellsville.

From the day more than 22 years ago that Sergeant Alvin C. York returned from France after his heroic exploits of capturing 132 German almost single handed, Jesse L. Laske the picture's producer, has been endeavoring to secure Mr. York's permission to film the story of his life. York refused to "capitalize on Uncle Sam's uniform," as he put it, until the current world crisis made him realize that he would be performing a timely patriotic service in allowing his story to be told on the screen.

Based on Sergeant York's own diary, the film tells a brave and straightforward narrative, the honest saga of a plain American who loved God, and was classified as a "conscientious objector." While differing in appearance externally, Gary Cooper is a close counterpart in character to the World War hero, playing the title role at the request of Mr. York.

While "Sergeant York" has appeared on Broadway and other road show engagements at \$2.20, the Wellsville theatre management is presenting the production at popular prices of 40c matinee, 55c evenings, and 17c for children, all prices including tax.

The film will be shown continuously each day for the entire engagement of Saturday thru Tuesday, starting at 1 p. m. each day.
