Service Classification No. 1 COMMERCIAL RATE

Applicable to Use of Service for All Purposes

CHARACTER OF SERVICE: Continuous alternating current; approximately 60 Cycle, 115 or 110-220 volts single phase or 220 volts three phase. The voltages stated are approximate only:

MINIMUM CHARGE: Per Month: Gross \$1.00, Net \$.90, except that for connected loads of 5KW or more the minimum charge is 80 cents per KW of total connected load.

DETERMINATION OF DEMAND: Connected load will be determined from the name-plate rating on motors and heating appliances, and lighting from the wattage of lamp except that no connected light sockets shall be at less than 50 watts.

TERMS OF PAYMENT: The difference between the gross amount and the net amount represents a discount. Payment of the net amount will be accepted on or before the date specified on the bill, otherwise the gross amount becomes due and payable.

CHARACTER OF SERVICE: Continuous alternating current, approximately 60 cycles, single phase 110 or 220 volt, two or three wire at the option of the Village. The voltages stated are approximate only.
