Drive Launched To Conserve Waste Paper

Mayor Carpenter Gathers Letter From Admin. Henderson Asking to Collect Waste Paper

The Honorable Mayor of Andover, New York, by dear Mr. Mayor: The National Waste Prevention Campaign is rapidly under way throughout the States. The Office of Price Administration wants to impress upon you the importance of waste paper in defense and enlists your aid in stimulating its collection. As you know, waste paper is a defense because it is a raw material for the production of ship detectors, Department of Defense figures show that about 400,000 tons of waste paper are produced in the United States each year. We must stop the burning of newspapers, magazines, and waste paper. Lack of paperboard containers to become a defense bottleneck. We need your help. If you are already co-operating in this campaign, these suggestions will help. If you have already made an effort toward waste paper conservation perhaps one of these suggestions may prove profitable:

- First: Make sure that all buildings and institutions are burning waste paper.
- Second: Get your Chamber of Commerce behind this project: upon the factories and business establishments in your community the importance of waste paper.
- Third: Devote press and radio addresses to encourage housewives to either sell their paper or give it away, burning it.
- Fourth: Get the waste paper and charities in your community to put on a greater drive to collect more waste paper. You may find it necessary to have waste paper conservation in order to see to it that the collection is carried on at top speed. This office is at your disposal at all times to help in this effort.
